



2. Heroes of 9/11


- Look at this painting by Henry E. Kidd for one minute. Then, close your book and list all the elements you can remember.

Do not forget to make the necessary changes. (Some words are repeated several times.)


The 1 men and women who entered the Twin Towers to 2 those inside are already recognized as 3 for the ages. Survivors of the attack speak of stairwells crowded with people determined to get downstairs to safety, while 4, 5, and other emergency workers were going in the opposite direction – running upstairs toward 5 danger, toward the heart of the 6, determined to save 7. Three hundred forty-three members of the New York City 8 Department lost their 9 on September 11 – a devastating blow to a Department that had lost 778 men since it was founded in 1865. Members of the New York City Police Department, the Port Authority Police, EMS workers and court officers also made great sacrifices amid startling acts of 10. Not a single one of those 11 died in vain. Their courage, selflessness and professionalism 12 more than 25,000 13 that day – making it the most successful rescue operation in our nation's history. These were true American patriots. They gave their 14 in defense of our 15.


